Title of photograph: Port Melbourne Icebergers, #1

Tell us about the photo: Swimming - the best antidote against loneliness, that is free and available all year long. This unintentional photo taken during a walk captures wellbeing at its peak. Taken on a cold May morning at 7:20 AM in 2025 from Port Melbourne pier, features two friends of mine from the Port Melbourne Icebergers swimming club — a beautiful community that embodies nature, being engaged in a consistent, holistic health practice, mindfulness, community and friendship around the year.

Title of photograph: St Kilda Pier, February, #38

Tell us about the photo: St Kilda Pier, February depicts a gentle collision between the old and the new. Shot during the very first summer of the St Kilda Pier reopening, the iconic history of the 1853 pier is captured through an encounter with modern summer life in Port Phillip: relaxing, soaking up sun-drenched days, and the art and science of risking your phone near the water with slippery hands, just to get that shot. This unedited photograph was taken by a local resident in 2025 on a Pentax Spotmatic, a 1970s camera, using black and white film developed at a local Victorian film lab. The choice of analogue film to depict a contemporary moment, entwined with layers of historical significance, echoes how past and present memories can flow together and how different visual and personal perspectives can bring harmony to a setting. I chose this image because it represents both nostalgia and revitalisation, just like the iconic pier we launch ourselves from on those hot summer St Kilda days.




Title of photograph: Pedestrian Overpass (Jacka Boulevard), #57

Tell us about the photo: Pure functionality and design merged together to create an iconic landmark in St Kilda used by hundreds of people every day. Some people hurry over it, momentarily frightened by the height, the constant cars passing underneath, and the way it moves slightly in the wind. Others take their time in wandering down the sweeping, rounded ramp, as kids zoom past on their bikes. Almost everybody has walked the overpass with something on their mind. My aim was to try to capture the mysterious energy that the pedestrian overpass has at night. The starkness of black and white is a contrast to the curvature of the bridge which has a friendly, almost welcoming feel.




Title of photograph: Park Towers, #47

Tell us about the photo: This photograph is of the Park towers which is a building that offers public housing. It's a building that is hard to miss. I've been a resident in the South Melbourne/Southbank area for some 4 years now and have always observed this building from different viewpoints. Humans have long been fascinated by height - by the scale of things that tower over us - and perhaps that's what first caught my eyes. Yet, beyond its size, Park Towers holds a deeper meaning. It's home to people doing it tough, a place that reflects both the strength and vulnerability within our community. I've always been struck by its color palette - the muted concrete offset by cool blue windows. Built between 1967 and 1969, it was once believed to be the tallest pre-cast, load-bearing wall building in the world, with more storeys than any other building in Melbourne at the time. Now, it stands as one of 44 public housing towers scheduled for demolition by 2051. I chose this building as my subject because it represents the impermanence of life and all its things and there is no better way to preserve something than by images.




Title of photograph: Hot day near St Kilda Pier , #82

Tell us about the photo: I shot this image of the rebuild to replace the former St Kilda Junction Mental Health Clinic (demolished and rebuilt by some rather fantastically devised architecture) and in early autumn this year (March 2025) I used my fairly new Apple i15 Phone to capture the uniqueness of it while waiting at the nearby bus shelter for the 246 bus to Elwood beach. Every time the 246 bus goes past it I am intrigued by the quaintness of this architecturally strange rebuild dominating that area of St Kilda Junction currently? The quaintness of the structure seems vaguely appropriate currently given what it has replaced – and potentially for many former patients who went there a sign of their own unique validity as well. But leaving an open-ended question mark hanging over it also! Although not technically good (as an iPhone is no match for a quality camera) I am submitting it for the uniqueness of its topic.

When was the photo taken?: Junction of St Kilda Road; Brighton Road and vaguely overlooking the Princes Highway and Dandenong Road underpass




Title of photograph: Old Sea Baths, #88

When was the photo taken?: early 80's




Title of photograph: Rippled reflections, #22




Title of photograph: Ghost Train attendant, Luna Park, #84




Title of photograph: St Kilda Bowls club Fitzroy St (2), #86

When was the photo taken?: May 2024




Title of photograph: smooth pedal strokes, #19






Title of photograph: Untitled No. 18, #32
